


CLUB HANDBOOK SEASON 2024/25

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"Welcome to the 2024/25 edition of Morpeth Town Juniors digital handbook – something we like to circulate to all the club's members and porents.

Last season was a very challenging one brought on by the persistent rain we experienced throughout the autumn, winter and well into Spring. This had a significant impact on our grassbased teams with many of our pitches at Chantry, Abbeyfields and Pegswood rendered unplayable from about November onwards. Fortunately, with access to the Craik Park 3G surface, we managed to plot our way through the extensive fixture backlog with many 7-a-side and 9-a-side games switched to that surface. It required some juggling of fixtures and a great deal of patience from everyone involved, but we eventually reached the end of the season in the last week in May.

As well as managing to get games played, our younger teams and their opposition enjoyed playing games on the artificial surface and the experience of playing at a 'football ground' and the club received many favourable comments as a consequence.

It also brought the club closer together, something it has struggled to do for many years. And that will be further enhanced with the club starting to use Morpeth Common as the home venue for nearly all our teams that play home and away games. It has been a long journey to reach this point – we opened negotiations with the council in 2020 (just before the pandemic), but having secured a 10 year licence of use and funding from the Football Foundation, the club was able to embark on a programme of works to restore the Common to a playable venue. Major works were undertaken in September 2023 and whilst the wet weather we experienced was a setback, we have managed to establish five of our planned six pitches on the site.

Are the pitches perfect? No. Are they where we want them to be? Not quite given the bad weather, but we've secured ongoing funding for the next 6 years to invest in proper pitch maintenance with the goal of improving the pitch quality over time. Additional Football Foundation has allowed the club to purchase new goalposts and a tractor with mower and equipment with the aim of making the Common a first class venue. Finally, between Craik Park and the Common, the Juniors can finally say, we have a 'home'!

CLUB GOVERNANCE

"Governance is all the systems, policies and procedures the club employs to frame the way the club is run all the time."

This is an all-encompassing phrase, but our governance dictates everything from how we manage our financial decisions to broad guidance into the practicalities of running a squad.

However, there are certain areas which are of greater importance in terms of meeting our expectations and our stated goal of being a **'standard bearer for grass roots youth football'**.

These are our :

- Codes of Conduct and Policies
- Safeguarding & Welfare
- Parental and Spectator Values

Codes of Conduct and Policies

We adhere to and endorse the various FA Codes of Conduct and Policies that are listed on our website www.morpethtownjuniors.co.uk/documents.

There are codes that cover players, coaches and spectators, but we need to be mindful of the content of these codes so that we're not blindly highlighting them without understanding and more important acknowledging and following them.

They have to be our guiding principles when it comes to how we operate.

Safeguarding

It is our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of every child or young

person at the club and it is inherent upon us to provide a safe environment for all members. Our safeguarding policy is on our website and EVERY coach involved at the club MUST have a current 'FA Safeguarding Children qualification'. There will be occasions when the welfare of a child is raised – be it from the club's perspective or via the actions of persons not connected with the club - and we are obliged to look into these matters. Our welfare team led by Sean Douglas actions this and if anyone has any queries regarding welfare or safeguarding issues, Sean and the team can be contacted via email at <u>welfare@morpethtownjuniors.co.uk</u>.

Parental and Spectator Values

Sadly, the number of reported incidents involving parents and spectators at grassroots youth football nationally, is rising significantly. Our local junior league is no exception and as a club, we need to remind parents and spectators of their obligations.

Football at all age levels can prompt emotions and it is important that we all remain POSITIVE in our approach to our children and coaches and to the opposition's players and coaches. Likewise to referees and other officials.

Such has been the incidence of disciplinary issues in the Northumberland Football League (and Morpeth Town Juniors hasn't been free of them), the club held a club-wide meeting last season with the mandatory attendance by a coach AND a parent from every squad to reaffirm our expectations and requirements for this coming season.

Win or lose, the most important thing is that your child enjoys their footballing experience and is playing in a supportive environment, rather than a hostile, aggressive and pressuring matchday environment.



CLUB STRUCTURE

Morpeth Town Juniors FC is an unincorporated association which means it is run by a group of individuals that is bound by the club's constitution.

CLUB COMMITTEE

The club is run by a committee of volunteers as detailed opposite. Ideally, there is a need to recruit more volunteers towards the management of the club and this is something the club will be looking at very carefully over the next 3-4 months.

Likewise the make-up of the roles – do they all remain appropriate? Are there areas where additional / new expertise is required? As the club grows, it is important that we have the capacity to manage this growth.

Presently, it is proving a challenge and something the club needs to address.



Notes to 2023/24 Accounts :

- 1. The club made a profit of £335 on turnover of £113,000.
- The club used its accrued reserve towards the works undertaken on Morpeth Common in September 2023. A capital sum of £20,000 was invested by the club into the project – just over £15,000 in this financial year.
- 3. Pitch and Training Hire expenses rose significantly due to the bad weather experienced during this season whilst kit expenses were lower than normal.

MORPETH TOWN JUNIORS CLUB DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2023-2028

In 2023, the club signed off a 5-year development plan and it accompanies this handbook.

This is a very aspirational plan, but it is essentially a business plan for the club to help it get from where it is now to where we want it to be in five years' time, in line with its vision and values. It has involved much self-analysis in line with the FA's England Accredited Scheme (we are a 3-star England Accredited club), identifying the issues and opportunities the club has. It recognises that the club is growing, much like the town itself, and what we need to do manage that growth whilst ensuring that we keep our vision and specific objectives in mind.

Club Vision and Missions

"Morpeth Town Juniors to be a distinct, respected and community focussed club run for the benefit of its members."

- Seek to provide football opportunities for all ages and abilities (playing and / or participation).
- Be recognised as an integral part of the Morpeth residential and commercial community.
- Help members maximise potential on and off the field.
- To run the club with the interests and wellbeing of the members a priority.
- To make being a member an enjoyable and worthwhile experience for the children and their families.
- To be recognised as a standard bearer for grassroots youth football.

It's a working document and forms part of the agenda at every committee meeting. It is anticipated an extensive review of the plan will be undertaken during the 2024/25 season, not only to assess the club's progress in meeting its objectives, but to consider the ongoing relevance of its existing objectives and to update in line with the club's current situation.

It's the members' club and the plan is built around its members.



MTJ DIGITAL – our online presence

The club's digital presence is still not where we need it, but it's fair to say, progress has been made in the last 12 months.

The club took the decision to come off 'X/Twitter' and now has just a Facebook and Instagram page in addition to the website. We're trying to align our online presence with the senior club's, as we seek to promote each other's activity.

There's still work to be done in this area, but a general lack of committee expertise and proactive involvement means we need to work harder. Adam Ormston has been appointed to oversee this area – he does some work with the senior club, so we hope to progress things in the coming months.

OUR PLAYING & TRAINING VENUES



CRAIK PARK – Our older teams that play 11v11 on a full-size pitch play their home games at Morpeth Town's ground at Craik Park. A state of the art, 3G surface installed in 2021, it represents one of the best junior home pitches in the area.

CHANTRY MIDDLE SCHOOL – Here we have a youth sized 11v11 pitch used by our U13s.

MORPETH COMMON – Used by the clubs teams between the ages of U10s and U14s whilst also available as an overflow to Craik Park for our U15s and older..

Our younger boys and girls' teams play at various CENTRAL VENUES.

CRAIK PARK – Many of the club's teams use Craik Park's floodlights for winter training.

CHANTRY MUGA – Another recently opened, floodlit facility that the club has access to. The venue provides a 45 x 30 sq metre 3G surface and can be hired as a single full pitch or split into two smaller areas.

CHANTRY TRAINING SHED – An indoor training venue that the club has used for a number of years.

MORPETH COMMON – The Common is used by teams outside of winter training times.

CHANTRY MIDDLE SCHOOL – The Minis and Wildcats (pre-team age groups) can be found there on Sunday mornings.





OUR PLAYING & TRAINING VENUES – MORPETH COMMON



Morpeth Common is going to be central to the club's future. For many years, the club has led a nomadic existence playing at various pitches in and around Morpeth. This has been functional, but has led to a very fragmented club with the annual fun day being the only opportunity to bring it together as a whole. With the opening of the 3G pitch at Craik Park, the club has sought to restore Morpeth Common back to what it was around 30 years ago, when there were numerous full-sized pitches there.

Via extended communications involving the club, Northumberland County Council, Northumberland FA and the Football Foundation, we have agreed a long-term licence for use at the site. The club undertook major renovation work to the Common in September 2023 and has just started using the pitches on site for the majority of our home and away teams. It will also see ongoing maintenance and improvement via 6 years' worth of support from the Football Foundation, both in terms of renovation work such as aeration, fertilising and overseeding and helping the club part finance the purchase of a tractor, mower and machinery. This will allow the club to proactively manage the pitches with the aim of improving their quality year on year.

Given its location next to Craik Park, it gives the club a real opportunity to create a 'home', where most of our teams can play and train, where we can utilise better the facilities of Morpeth Town AFC and Craik Park whilst creating a better club environment. In addition to better quality pitches which the club can manage, the senior club can benefit with increased footfall in and around their facilities thereby cementing the relationship between the Juniors and Morpeth Town AFC. A very important development for the club.











This last 12 months has seen the club embark on a number of initiates, many of which we would not have been able to undertake without the support of external funding / grant bodies – primarily the Football Foundation. The club has worked with the Foundation to ensure a series of projects have come together or are in progress to benefit the club and its members – such as the Common project mentioned above.

Whilst the club had to commit funding of around £38k over the last year, grants from the Football Foundation were received as follows :

- £56,950 towards the initial improvement works undertaken at Morpeth Common in September 2023.
- £66,560 (payable over a 6-year period) from the Foundation's Grass Pitch Maintenance Fund towards ongoing improvement and maintenance of the grass pitches at the Common.
- £28,350 towards the purchase of a tractor, mower and quadraplay allowing the club to proactively manage and maintain the Common when required.
- £11,880 towards the purchase of the new goalposts and nets for both the Common and Craik Park

Aside from this funding, the club has also secured a grant of £1,000 from the **Barclays Sported Fund** towards the provision of a disability offering which its planning in the final quarter of this year.

And finally, via the Howdens Game Changer Programme, a partnership between Howdens and England Football, the club was able to secure a new kitchen for the proposed 'Far Post' kitchen container at the South-East corner of Craik Park.

A great deal of time and effort has been spent both securing these grants and implementing the work required to maximise the benefit of this funding and this work will continue in the coming years to ensure the club and its members fully benefit.

The club's thanks goes to all parties involved in helping these things come to fruition.



OUR CLUB COACHING

With 40 squads for the upcoming 2024/25 season, it can be difficult to present a consistent coaching style or philosophy, but in line with our club development plan we are aiming to do this. Our coaching needs to ensure the children are having FUN and get enjoyment from playing the game. It needs to be player-focused with the aim of developing a child's footballing skills in an environment where they can learn football without the pressure to win – especially at the younger age groups.

We align our coaching with the FA's England DNA, its four-cornered model and apply it in line with the relevant age phases of development. The FA four-cornered model encompasses four key attributes that are vital for any developing young footballer: **Physical, Technical, Psychological** and **Social** elements, helping children to develop more than just their football skills – *Helping them to gain confidence, build self-esteem, learn to work as a team and improve their decision making.*

Each team at the club aims to have a minimum of one hour's coaching per week (weather and coach availability permitting) and in addition to all coaches being DBS approved, every team must have at least one coach holding the FA's Introduction to Coaching Football qualification. That qualification can be supplemented by locally delivered coach the coach sessions run by Northumberland FA.. Underpinning all this is the club's guide detailing 'our coaching ethos – the way we coach'. This document provides guidance and information for parents and coaches with the aim of promoting a consistent approach to coaching club-wide.

The club endeavours to be player focused and does not develop a win at all costs mentality. It doesn't discourage winning – far from it – but age-appropriate player development and enjoyment are key objectives for the club and should form the basis of our coaching.



A key resource available to all our coaches is the club's subscription to **'The Coaching Manual'.**

It is an extensive package built for coaches who want to improve their understanding of coaching and find real, practical sessions which they can use to accelerate the development of their players

In addition, the club is hoping to open a **'Coaches' Room'** at Craik Park if they want to take their squad in for some tactical analysis and feedback. The container above the 'Highwaymen' sign is being renovated for that purpose, but some teams may be able to benefit from the VEO camera that the senior club has.

It is early days in terms of formulating how best to use this space, but another development for the club, its coaches and players for the 2024/25 season.



MORPETH MINIS

MORPETH MINIS is the club's ever popular sessions for boys in the pre-team age groups (mainly Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 children, although some slightly younger attend in the summer before they start school).

It is run every Sunday morning at Chantry Middle School with sessions at 9.00 - 10.00 and 10.00 - 11.00. It is available for any child to attend, whatever their ability.

The emphasis of MORPETH MINIS is for the children to have fun whilst learning the basic motor and football skills. For those that want to, there are opportunities to join the club's U7 teams which is the youngest age group where organised games are played.

MORPETH MINIS is run by club chairman Paul Barwick (a fully qualified coach) along with DBS checked volunteers and the focus is to develop the following aspects of a child's ability :

- Ball introduction
- Small-sided games more touches for everyone
- Ball manipulation / mastery
- Skill development
- Social and confidence development
- Motor skills

MORPETH WILDCATS

MORPETH WILDCATS mirrors MORPETH MINIS by providing pre-team football opportunities for girls (mainly for girls in School Years 1 and 2, although younger and older children still attend).

In the past, some girls used to attend Morpeth Minis, but often found it a little intimidating playing with mostly boys. Wildcats provides the ideal opportunity for girls to come along and enjoy sessions whilst accommodating an increasing demand for girls' football.

It is run every Sunday morning at Chantry Middle School (11.00 - 12.00) and is available for any girl to attend, whatever their ability.

The emphasis of MORPETH WILDCATS is for the girls to have fun whilst learning the basic motor and football skills. For those that want to, there are opportunities to join the club's U7s or U8s teams which is the youngest age group where organised girls' games are played.

MORPETH WILDCATS is run by club chairman Paul Barwick (a fully qualified coach) along with DBS checked volunteers and the focus is develop the following aspects of a child's ability :

- Ball introduction
- Small-sided games more touches for everyone
- Ball manipulation / mastery
- Skill development
- Social and confidence development
- Motor skills

The FA Foundation Phase is covered largely by 'Mini Soccer' which is the introduction to organised football for young players.

The emphasis at this age group HAS to be on the children enjoying their first taste of football and honing their skills. No results or league tables are published as the FA believes that the focus should be on individual skill development as opposed to winning. The club follows this ethos as children develop at different speeds and ages and it seeks to promote equal playing time and positional rotation.



YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PHASE

The FA Youth Development Phase covers the U12 to U16 age range.

The emphasis changes a little with an increased focus on performance and less positional rotation. Whilst the club still seeks to adhere to its general ethos, as children get older, the natural tendency to be more competitive is reflected in how the teams start to operate.

Individual player development and opportunity remains a priority and it's certainly not a case of 'win at all costs', but increased tactical and positional awareness will lend itself to a more competitive outlook and coaching decisions and strategies will reflect this.


OUR PATHWAY TO ADULT FOOTBALL

As an England Accredited 3-star club, we need to create a pathway into adult football for both boys and girls. It's fair to say that as a club, many of our oldest members leave to go to university, but those that do stay locally, we want to see progress into adult football.

There are options and we don't have to form our own adult teams, but for males we have a connection to Morpeth FC (see below) whose current squad includes a number of ex-juniors. On the female side, we have Morpeth Town Women who had an excellent first season culminating in promotion. Finally, as part of our link with Morpeth Town FC, some of our juniors progress to their academy – its post 16 football and education programme.

PATHWAY TO ADULT FOOTBALL – MORPETH TOWN WOMEN



What a first season Morpeth Town Women had as they finished second in the Northumberland Football League Division 1 winning 19 of their 22 games. A well-deserved promotion to the Premier League was gained and the club looks forward to the coming season with some additions to the playing squad.

Not only was the creation of a women's team long overdue in the town, it creates a pathway for the Juniors' older girls to continue into adult football. It also sits nicely alongside Morpeth Town FC (the senior club) which has fully embraced the team and its growing band of supporters.

Moves are also being made to create a development squad – a squad playing at an appropriate level that can bridge the step between junior female football and the adult game. With the club having an U16 team and other teams progressing through the age groups, it's important to maintain a viable stepping stone to the older format. Girls from aged 16 can play for the adult team and an handful of girls made that step last season and did well.

ALONGSIDE the team, the club is also running a participation group for women. These are for those that don't want to be part of the playing team, but want to enjoy some coached sessions and an enjoyable kick around on a regular basis to improve fitness in a social environment.

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Our kit is bespoke to the club and not based on a manufacturer's template and for 2024/25, we've updated our kit to give it a more contemporary feel. Made by Errea, the home kit is short sleeved and remains based on the traditional amber and black stripes coupled with plain black shorts and socks, the colours worn by Morpeth Town and the Juniors for many years.

The club will gradually phase in this new kit as and when teams are due to renew their kits, but the initial response to the new look has been positive. The club rarely has a colour clash when playing (aside from Berwick Rangers Juniors), so the club keeps a stock of away shirts of varying sizes and numbers which individual squads can utilise and return as and when required. The blue shirts also mirror the colours sported by the senior club in recent seasons.

Playing kit belongs to the club, not the player. If a player leaves the club, the kit must be returned; in the case of a transfer, this will need to have taken place prior to the transfer being sanctioned in accordance with league rules.

EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES



This is an area we want to explore further. What opportunities can we offer our members that can provide mutual benefit for the club and its members?

Via the FA's 4-cornered coaching model to which the club subscribes, children should develop skills and characteristics – be they physical, social, technical or psychological, but what other opportunities can we offer?

Coaching Opportunities – looking at children doing their FA coaching qualifications whilst giving them the chance to join younger squads at the club to support existing coaches and develop their own coaching skills.

OUR PARTNERSHIPS & COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS





Key to our development is to cement and strengthen our relationship with Morpeth Town FC. Whilst we are a totally separate entity (primarily for financial reasons as we are membership based and the senior club is run as a business), we want to be seen as part of the same so that both parties can mutually benefit from the presence of the Juniors.

With the help of a local FA Consultant, we are currently exploring ways to capitalise on our association and forge ever closer links and initiatives with the Morpeth community.

Actualize Goalkeeping (Dale Walker) provided our specialist coaching to our junior keepers last season and whilst Dale has been unable to continue due to increased professional commitments, we have agreement with ex-pro goalkeeper and goalkeeping coach at Hartlepool and Darlington Jim Provett to take over this season. Fun Day collections have allowed us to make charitable donations to the Wansbeck Valley Food Bank in Morpeth, Barnabas and Brightred.org – a local charity helping people with blood cancer – and in 2024, Morpeth Lions. We hope to improve on this next year.

GMS assists us on pitch maintenance and will be an important ongoing partner at Morpeth Common, and via Thomas Sherriff & co, the club has purchased its own maintenance machinery and equipment. We continue to use the facilities at Chantry / Three Rivers Trust for training and games. Elite Embroidery are our kit supplier (in conjunction with Errea) and LoveAdmin provides membership

THE EMILY PATTISON AWARD






Emily Pattison was a club member who had played for the club's U16 Girls team when she suddenly and very unexpectedly died in August 2018, two days before receiving her GCSE results.
